She began her life on the stocks at Ramsey Shipyard in the Isle of Man in 1863. In 1871 she was purchased by the Shaw Savill line of London and embarked on a quarter century of hauling emigrants to New Zealand, sometimes also touching Australia, California and Chile. She made 21 circumnavigations in this service, some of them lasting up to a year. This discussion lecture will explore key voyages which linked the flowering of the enlightenment to the founding of California.
